Healey #174—Original Dash Paint

Shared via Michael Salter's Blog May 2012

In my continuing efforts to accurately archive as many details of this very early Austin Healey 100 as I can I have spent time gently sanding through the paint on the dash in an attempt to determine its original colour.

I want to emphasize that all I am doing here is cataloging what I'm finding as I disassemble this particular car and I am in no way suggesting that this information will be accurate for other Austin Healey 100s of this era.

The dash consists of 2 aluminium pressings. One I call the Dash and the other, which is attached to the Dash I call the Instrument Pod.

The Instrument Pod is mounted onto the surface of the Dash and attached using screws inserted from the rear.

Here are some background points:

- 1. The back of the Dash is a dark brown with some small areas at the ends having been over sprayed with black
- 2. The Dash has been apart.
 i.e. the Instrument Pod has
 at some time been
 separated from the Dash
 and the rubber strip which
 is meant to act as a seal
 between them is missing.
 (I'm absolutely confident
 that the safety gauge has

never been removed from the car and pretty sure that the Dash itself has never been removed from the car. Because the safety gauge has a liquid filled capillary tube running from it to the radiator the Instrument Pod almost certainly has never been moved more than a few inches from its installed position).

- 3. As every part of the front of the Dash has black primer which has been sprayed over with a brown paint (primer?) which is consistent with the rest of the paint on the inner body, I think it is fairly safe to conclude that the Dash has never been stripped to bare metal. (The outer surfaces of the body have been stripped bare and on them light grey primer has been used).
- 4. The last paint applied to the Dash was a silver/blue colour which was very poorly done in that there is no paint up over the top of the Dash where it is hidden from view by the rear lip of the front shroud.

The Instrument Pod

The Dash appears to have been painted red originally as can be determined by studying the image to the right of an area adjacent to the grab handle on the right side of the Dash

The next image is from the area of the Dash at the top of where the Instrument Pod is installed.

Of particular note is the gloss black which was the top surface of the Dash under the Instrument Pod.

When Peter Svilans and I first looked at that black we thought it may be a dark blue, but we have concluded that it is definitely black.


There is no sign of red under the part of the Dash originally covered by the Instrument Pod or anywhere on the Instrument Pod itself.

The grey on the instrument pod (1st coat on top of the medium brown primer) is very similar, if not identical to the blue/grey (Healey Grey?) that I have concluded was the original colour of this car.


Although most of the original interior was missing from the car some remnants remained and they appear to confirm that the interior was trimmed in dark blue.

This one really has me scratching my head as the conclusions that I have come to are completely out of line with what is "accepted" as the usual.



Paint layers on the Instrument Pod



Hearts keep pounding for Healeys

They gleamed like thoroughbred colts on Kentucky Derby Day.

They arrived with a throaty exhaust roar, in burnished reds and creams and British Racing Green, with wire wheels and leather upholstery evoking an era 20 years ago, long before Japanese auto makers vowed to take over the world.

More than 150 enthusiasts from acress North America chose Toronto this weekend to continue their love affair with one of the classic British sports cars - the Austin-Healey.

Costly hobby

It was the fifth annual get-together of the Austin-Healey Club of America. the first held outside the United States and the biggest homage yet to this vintage model.

And there to greet everybody at the Inn on the Park was Donald Healey, the British engineer who created the

original Healey in the 1940s.

Healey, still sprightly and bright-eyed at 82, confessed he's had nothing to do with motor cars directly since 1968, when he retired to his Cornwall birthplace.

"I'd forgotten the cars until seeing them here and recently in Europe. The thing that is most pleasing to me is that I never thought I would make so many friends in life through this

sports car."

Healey, who flew into Toronto Friday night with his son, Geoffrey, had come from similar Austin-Healey get-togethers in Germany, Switzer-land and Austria. "The Germans prob-ably spend more on refurbishing their Healeys than anyone else. They're ready to pay out \$20,000 for someone to reconstruct their cars. It's even more than in the U.S."

Prettiest sports car

Not that anyone could accuse the enthusiasts gathered in Toronto of treating their Healeys with anything less than the passion lavished on a mistress.

"They're prettier than other sports cars. They've got more pizzazz and others don't have their classic lines," said Tom Busch, president of the Austin-Healey Club of America.

And he should know. He's had seven of the lithe, long-nosed machines. The latest acquisition is a 1961 model that he bought last Christmas for \$5,100

(U.S.). But the Healey isn't the kind of car you drive to work daily. So Busch, a 32-year-old engineering parts salesman from Fort Wayne, Ind., has a

1980 Oldsmobile Toronado. He also has a 1934 Auburn.

Austin-Healeys, defined as "collectibles," fetch up to \$8,000 in the specialized used car market. "Someone offered \$10,000 for a friend's Healey on the hotel parking lot. But she said 'No." Busch told The Star.

One Toronto enthusiast says he's refused a \$13,000 offer for his Healey, which he's raced at Mosport, Harewood and Watkin's Glen.

But Healey freaks are not in it for the profit. Most admit they're indulging extended childhood fantasies and their highly-polished machines are extremely sophisticated and lovable

"I've been into boats, and aircraft and I love cars too," said Robin Sloan, who only had to drive from Willowdale for the Healey bash.

Healey popular

Sloan, who had his 1959 Austin-Healey renovated after buying it two years ago, also has "Mgs, Porsches and a Jaguar. I rent 16,000 square feet at an industrial unit to keep them."

Mike Jaycock, of the Hamilton Austin-Healey Club, which organized the get-together, says there are 800 to 900 of the cars in Canada that "we know of and there could be three or four times that number in fact.

"When this got under way we got calls from people in London, and Windsor who'd seen the cars and wanted to know where they could see the Healeys. This car has that kind of

More than 73,000 were produced in Britain and 80 per cent were exported to North America, most to California.

Auto romance

Convoys of Healeys came from as far as Dallas, Tex., as well as Ohio, Missouri, Connecticut and throughout New York state for the Metro gather-

Dave Gibson, a Transport Canada flight service specialist, came from Yellowknife in the North West Territories. But he didn't drive all the way. "I picked up my Healey at my father's place in Winnipeg. The only thing was when I got here the electrics burned out," he said as he tinkered anxiously with a wholesale re-wiring repair job.

Sometimes in the pursuit of auto ro-

mance you have to suffer.

But originator Donald Healey doesn't drive a Healey any more.

"I have a Mini. The Healey's a bit awkward to get into when you're my age."




