Member Share: Original BJ8 Owner: Part 1

After seeing many 'Healey stories' in various publications over the years, I've had this thought of sharing part of my Healey story.

I was 23 years old when my wife and I bought our Healey. I am now turning 77 years young. The Healey has been our first & 4th child!

I have been retired for 17 years now and have just started to document our Healey life experience.

History:

I am a "Blitz baby" born in London, England. We immigrated to Toronto Canada via Halifax in January 1948 onboard the Aquitania.

My Dad's first ever car was a 1949 Austin A40 purchased in 1950.

I met Lynne in high school at the age 17 at RH King Collegiate in Scarborough Ontario. My first car in 1961 was a '49 Morris Minor I bought for \$110. Added gold painted reverse rims, port-a-walls & a whip antenna (the radio got AM only and had vacuum tubes).

I remember my first glimpse of a Healey was of an older 100-6 model in the early 60's - I liked the scale, the big motor, the big wheels, the open cockpit and the sound. It looked like it was moving while standing still. I was riding a 1952 BSA single lung 350 at that time.

From high school, Lynne went off to teachers college and soon a teaching job while I went off to study electrical engineering at the University of Toronto. Both still living at home our paths crossed in earnest in the late summer of 1966 when we thought "'let's get married". Neither had any money but Lynne had a job. Having just finished 3rd year engineering, we married in June 1967 and rented the ground floor of an old house in Toronto's Beach area (our friends seriously thought we had moved to the slums – today the Beach is one of the tony areas of Toronto).

I commuted by street car through my final year at U of T and Lynne continued with her \$3,400.00 per year teaching job. We had a new bed donated by Lynne's Mom and a borrowed couch from my parents plus a 1/3 of an old pool table top on top of a glass aquarium serving as a floor seating height

eating table. Rent was \$130/month.

By March of 1968 we were still very broke and final exams were not far off. Winter was starting to let go of its grip and the annual CNE Sportsman show was on at the CNE. It was a weekend and we decided to take the streetcar to the CNE and 'walk around the show'.

Very soon after arriving at the Sportsman's show I spied an Austin Healey BJ8 slowly turning around on a large carpeted turn table. The car was in front of a 'Church Motors' (British United Automobiles 737 Church St. at Yonge Toronto 5 Ontario) sales booth. I immediately engaged a salesman and quickly stated that 'when I get a job that's the car I'm going to buy'. The salesman promptly said 'well you better hurry up they're not making them anymore' followed by 'do you want me to try to find you one?' (I guess they were just using the Healey which I believe was sold as an 'eye catcher'). After a very quick discussion with Lynne I said 'yes'. Lynne wrote out a \$50.00 deposit cheque, we continued our show tour and went home on the street car.

About two weeks passed and the phone rang. It was Church Motors saying that they had found a Healey. It was in a crate somewhere on the Canadian east coast. That's all they knew (we were hoping for British Racing green) and did I want it? The base price was \$3995.00. I said yes, Lynne went to her teachers' credit union and successfully negotiated a 5 year \$5000.00 loan.

About a week and a half later on a Saturday, Lynne & I took public transit to Church Motors and picked up a brandnew Colorado Red Austin Healey 3000 Mk III (HBJ8L/42778G) with 32 miles on the clock.

I was told HBJ8L42778G was likely built in the late fall of 1967 but with the timing of this sale it was registered officially as a 1968 vehicle in Ontario. Based on literature I've read the last Phase 2 BJ8 was number 43026 making my car the 248th from the end of production.

\$4,200.00 later for added charges, I don't recall the details of, + \$50.00 for the radio, we drove away headed to Lynne's parents' house to show off our new purchase. After car insurance and a celebratory meal out at a restaurant the \$5k had basically disappeared!

Lynne's parents were not impressed to the extent that they did not venture out to the driveway to take a look but did suggest that \$5k would have made a nice real estate down payment. After a short in house visit we said our goodbyes and Lynne and I got into the Healey parked in the driveway. As I attempted to engage reverse gear I ended up with the entire gear shift lever in my hand. The lever had completely parted from the transmission as the engine purred at idle. Lynne and I returned to her parents' house. I called Church Motors (it was still Saturday). Church sent out a technician who proceeded to basically remove the interior of our new car, seats and all, outside in the driveway. After a long time the shift lever was reinserted with retaining screws in place and finally the interior was replaced allowing us to escape.

It was now into April with my thesis review and final exams spread over 2 weeks I needed to avoid distractions. Somehow (it made total sense in 1968) I drove the Healey to the University every day to and from our house through all the final exams and thesis reviews and parked it all day on public streets like St. George. There were no parking rules or costs in those days. I was also a key organizer of our engineering off campus grad ball. It never occurred to me that I would not graduate or find a good job. Thankfully I did both!


